Organ Convention to Visit Bernadotte and St. George

It's been "in the works" for well over a year—now we have the details to share!

Two local church organs will be featured when members of the Organ Historical Society visit southern Minnesota Tuesday, August 8. Up to six busloads of organ enthusiasts will visit as part of the organization's 2017 national convention. The August 5-11 event, based at the InterContinental Hotel in St. Paul, will include recitals at 36 venues in Minnesota and Wisconsin over the seven days.

The Tuesday recitals will be held from 2:00 to 2:30 p.m. at Bernadotte Lutheran Church and 3:25 p.m. to 3:55 p.m. at St. George Catholic Church. Both churches are home to historic Vogelpohl & Spaeth organs, built in New Ulm. Bernadotte's was put into use in 1898 and St. George's in 1904.

Specially selected organists will present the recitals. Peter Crisafulli—minister of music at All Saints Episcopal Church, Chevy Chase, Maryland since 1988—will present the concert at Bernadotte while Isaac Drewes—a senior organ performance and church music major at St. Olaf College in Northfield—will play at St. George.

The southern Minnesota day will also include recitals at First Lutheran Church in St. Peter at 10:30 a.m., and at Our Lady of Good Counsel Chapel at 7:00 p.m.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend any of the concerts.

Heidi's Interim Minister Message

Ruth approached me after worship today (Sunday, July 23), asking when I'd be sending my contribution to the August FOG Newsletter. I had started it a few days ago when she first sent a reminder of the due date, but I'm not feeling particularly generative right now, so didn't get very far. I think my brain has been taken up with anxiety about a major paper that is due July 31.

So I went back to the computer this afternoon, hoping for Divine inspiration, but I have to be honest and say, "I got nothin'!"

But wait, I have pages of notes from summer classes that I can share. Below is a random sample, nuggets of theology and practice from my professors at Wartburg Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa.

God alone is the source of life, healing, and forgiveness.

What do we mean when we reference the "Word of God?"

- 1) First and foremost, the Word of God is the Eternal Word who became incarnate in Jesus Christ.
- 2) Secondly, the Word of God is the oral proclamation of the Word
 - 3) Thirdly, the Word of God is Scripture in its writteness.

Christians fundamentally address God as Father on account of how Jesus addresses God as Abba. It is appropriate to speak of the motherly heart of God, but we don't address God as mother. The language of father is the language of profound intimacy. Father is not about a male being.

For Christians, all language about God is language about God in Jesus Christ through the Holy Spirit.

Young people see no value in joining an organization that is not connected to what is going on in the world.

The road to congregational vitality is turning outward. Our instinct is to close ranks and hold on to what we have. But, God in Christ through the Holy Spirit is calling us outside the walls of the church and into the world.

A Report from the Southwest Minnesota Synod Assembly

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to attend the 2017 Southwest Minnesota Synod Assembly held at Gustavus Adolphus in June. As in past years, it was two days filled with information and inspiration.

At last year's assembly, it was announced that the SWMN Synod had been awarded a \$500,000 grant from the Lilly Foundation. This funding initiative is known as "EMBRACE God's Mission, EQUIP God's People" and includes three focus areas—Developing Servant Leaders; Deepening Congregational Vitality; and Enhancing Local and Global Mission. The grant requires that the SWMN Synod provide a \$250,000 match. \$52,485 is required to meet that \$250,000. goal. God's Mission is moving forward in our Synod and lives of individuals and congregations are being changed because of this initiative.

Business enacted at the assembly included the passage of Resolution 17.01 which addressed a minimal change in language concerning rostered leaders and their voting status. Other business items were a review of the 2016 financial statement and the presentation of the 2017 proposed budget. Three new members were elected to serve on the Synod Council, one member to the Consultation Committee, and one new member to the Discipline Committee.

There has been a lot of discussion lately as to the future—or the lack thereof—of "church life" as we know it today. A lack of participation seems to be the norm for many congregations of all faiths these days.

How do we "do church" in the future? How do people worship, serve, connect, grow in faith, reach out? What will our congregation or parish look like in the future?

As Bishop Jon Anderson presented his annual report, we were asked to share at our tables something in our lives that we were proud of. My first reaction to this request was surprise, as I had been taught "pride was not a virtue." I have spent some time thinking about this since. Now I can say that I am very proud in this year—the 500th year of the Reformation—of my Lutheran heritage and that I am a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. I am extremely proud that I am a member of the SWMN Synod of the ELCA. A Synod that has an enthusiastic, inspirational, forward-thinking Bishop that is not afraid to look at the future and address the hard realities. A synod that has excellent synod ministers, committed leaders and staff, and a dedicated membership that knows we are "saved by grace" and good works follow. A synod that gave \$ 665,072 to World Hunger in 2016 and sent 84 Young Adults in Global Mission to spend one year in service in various parts of the world. A synod that preaches a Gospel of love and inclusiveness.

I would encourage you to say "yes" the next time your nominating committee person asks you to represent your congregation at the SWMN Synod Convention. You will be informed, inspired, and glad you said yes.
